Eastern Congo: Uvira is home to 250,000 people who live with the daily uncertainties of war. At one time Uvira was a nice city on the shore of Lake Tanganyika with mountains rising on the other side of the road. Following years of civil war, Uvira is a dust bowl of destruction. The only road in the city is sometimes paved, more often dirt and rock, dropping off more than ten feet on either side. In the midst of a war zone, with bombs and guns filling the air, this was one of the most challenging crusades we have had in many years.

We had a hard time getting here because of the guns and shooting: Fighting resumed a few days before the crusade began. Throughout the days and nights, gunfire and bombs were our constant companion. The first day of the crusade the choir sang a chorus, *We had a hard time getting here because of the guns and shooting, but God made a way.*" As in the early church in the USA, the choirmaster in Africa often sings a chorus of the day's experience and the choir repeats it in song. Rebel soldiers were ever present during the entire crusade.

S piritual Breakthrough: People were clearly afraid and discouraged as they came to the crusade. Almost everyone in attendance had family members killed during the long genocides; many saw the massacres; others participated in the killing. The message of forgiveness was the point of spiritual breakthrough. At first people were afraid to respond to the altar calls because of soldiers standing in the background. As the days went on, hundreds of people, including rebel soldiers, responded to message of salvation as they filled the altar area, falling on their faces before God.

Four times each year a select group of pastors attend the three week seminars in which they are taught bible doctrine, church government, pastoral ministry and a variety of other subjects including how to develop effective sermons, how to preach, how to teach the bible, prayer and leadership development.

Robert Mango reported that a new church has been started in the Congolese refugee camp in Goma and over forty people were baptized within one hour of the crusade we held in the camp two months ago.
